There is very little to report from HPA this month. Whilst we are still heavily involved in establishing the community house, we have enjoyed the Labour Day weekend, Applefest, and the Easter break along with everyone else in Harcourt.

April suddenly seems very autumnal after the heat of only a couple of weeks ago, and it looks like more, much needed, rain is coming. This seems like a good time for planning and there is one calendar date coming up that is an opportunity for every volunteer-involving organisation in Harcourt and Castlemaine to note. National Volunteer Week (20 -26 May) is now in its 35th year, having started in May 1989. It is described by Volunteering Australia as:

'the premier celebration of volunteers and volunteering in Australia and provides an opportunity to highlight the role of volunteers in our community and to say thank you to the millions of Australians who volunteer'.

In Australia in 2010, 36% of the population over the age of 15 volunteered for community organisations in 2020 the figure had dropped to 25%.

At the 2021 Census, Harcourt had a population of 1,038. with 82.4% of our population over the age of 15 – which is just over 850 people. According to the national volunteer statistics, one quarter of us over the age of 15 are very likely to be volunteers so, at least theoretically, we have around 212 people to thank for keeping our important CFA emergency service, service clubs, museum, the bowls, football, netball, and pony clubs, playgroup, school parent group, church, progress association, community newspaper, community house, model railway, CWA etc. etc. for providing community support and opportunities for the residents of Harcourt.

# NCCMA Results of Flood Study April 10 – Heritage Centre

The North Central Catchment Management Authority (NCCMA) has arranged two drop-in presentations of the Flood Study carried out in 2023.

The two sessions at the ANA Hall are on Wednesday 10 April (from 3:30-5 pm and 6-7:30 pm). The purpose of these sessions is to present the final results of their flood study to the community.

Council has prepared a Shape page (<u>https://shape.</u> <u>mountalexander.vic.gov.au/harcourt-flood-study</u>) on this study. The introduction to the results says, 'We (the Shire) have delivered the Harcourt Flood Study in partnership with the North Central Catchment Management Authority. This important process will strengthen decision-making related to land use and development, and improve flood warning and emergency agency response activities.'

Flood study maps, while not available as yet will be produced shortly (according to the Shape page). One of the questions answered on the Shape page is:

• What does this mean for me and my property?

The answer provided is: 'Access to detailed flood information will become available for landowners, developers and prospective purchasers to understand the flood risk associated with their property.

Council and North Central CMA will also use the data to inform land use and development decisions, and shape planning overlays to be introduced to the Mount Alexander planning scheme.

Affected landowners will be engaged in a separate process closer to the Planning Scheme Amendment process.

So, read up and come along to find out what the impacts on your property might be because of identified potential flooding in areas of Harcourt.

# **Blume's Bakery**

Over the last couple of years, The Core has been reporting on the progress towards the re-opening of Blume's Bakery. The family house and bakery is located on the corner of Victoria Road and Harmony Way. Blume's Bakery operated in Harcourt from 1921 (but began at Barkers Creek in 1862) and closed in 1960. Jodie and David Pillinger bought the house, rescued the wood fired oven, and began baking delicious breads and treats several years ago. Circumstances caused them to pause, but with new works happening at the front of the property and behind the scenes, they will soon be fully operational, although no firm date is available as yet.

One of Jodie and David's major goals when they first moved to Harcourt was to restore the fence. It's taken some time, but it is now complete with original gates. The restored front fence of the bakery has caught the eye of many people due to its outstanding workmanship.

The fence is such an eye-catcher, that long-time local, Faye Hards noticed the photos below when clearing out her mother's estate. Faye gave them to Jodie, as there is no doubt that the wedding party is standing in front of the original front fence of the house. **Wedding photo 2**: Groom, Lindsay Warren with his bride (no first name; surname Faull).

Wedding photo 3: Garth Symes, Lindsay Warren, bride (no first name; surname Faull), bridesmaid (not named) Bill Hoare, Alan Robins, (Minister) and then Howard Carr's name is tacked on the end. The flower girls, who seem to have been caught off-guard, are also not named.

There are only four men in the photo. Is it possible that all the photos were taken by Howard?

### Hold off on burning your bonfire

The leaves on the trees are showing signs of changing colour indicating that summer may have passed, but warmer weather has continued through March, as was expected, and fire restrictions are still in place throughout Victoria. While there is no date set yet for the end of restrictions, when they do end, it is important to still be aware of your responsibility when burning off. I have noticed many piles of vegetation around the district obviously waiting for this time. Important things to remember when the time comes is to not only register your burn, but also ensure that the weather conditions will be right and there is no expected wind change or gusts predicted. Always ensure you have enough resources on hand, which includes manpower and sufficient water to keep it under control. If there is no date set for the ending of restrictions in April, they will automatically end on 1 May, unless overridden due to continued risk. We have been fortunate to have a reasonably quiet season and it would be a shame to undo the good work done by everybody by letting the guard down.

### Brigade Activity

Early in March the brigade attended a grass and scrub fire on the Calder Freeway at Taradale. The brigades paged first were Elphinstone, Malmsbury and Taradale. Early in the incident the response was escalated. Harcourt was included as one of the seventeen additional brigades, in addition to aerial support. Freeway design, including wire rope barriers, was one of the issues encountered. Many hands on deck ensured that the mop up did not drag too long into the night.

The second call was on March 11 when smoke was sighted in the vicinity of the intersection of Fogartys Gap Road and Woodbrook Road in Walmer. This turned out to be one of those situations where there was smoke sighted initially, but no fire was found. Rubber tyre marks on the road indicated

the likely cause of the smoke and so the callout was declared a 'false alarm, good intent' and, therefore, we returned the trucks to the shed. The third turnout was to a shed/workshop fire in White Gum Road on March 23.

As you can see from the above, no two jobs are the same. This is why the brigade has a training calendar that covers a variety of topics and scenarios throughout the year. It's a good idea to apply this principle to your emergency plan. It should not only cover fire, but the variety of emergencies that can occur at any time. Recently, the SES distributed an Emergency Management Guide (circulated with the Midland Express delivery), which is a valuable tool to keep on your fridge. If you did not get one then I am sure that if you contact the SES they will have extra copies available.

The deployment of Harcourt Tanker 1





last month to the large fire over near Beaufort saw five overnight crews despatched, as well as other members assisting with the logistics of returning trucks back home. Fortunately, weather conditions predicted during this time did not eventuate so the deployment ended up being shorter than planned.

Applefest was another day of warm weather. Brigade members manned our site throughout the day and valued the opportunity to engage with you, the public. Unfortunately, due to the day being a declared a day of Total Fire Ban for the Shire of Mount Alexander, the North West Community Education group was not able to attend, hence we did not have the little fire truck for the kids to play on. Due to the site next to us not being used, we were able to squeeze in our Tanker 2 for display as well as our little squirty trucks. It was a successful day overall given the conditions and, fortunately, there was no call out to interrupt the day.

Before too long the chills of winter will be approaching, and our focus will be on fire safety around the house. The first step for those who still have the older battery smoke detectors will be to change the battery in line with the end of Daylight Saving.

Included in the budget is a section on fees and charges. Many charges are set by the state so they are outside our control. Charges set by Council often seem to be rising, so I suggest you look at these when you see the draft budget. You could say this is reading the fine print.

There was a sense of foreboding in weather forecasts in the days leading up to Harcourt's big day. March 9 was to be a day of Total Fire Ban. The radio advised us that music festivals had been cancelled throughout western Victoria. But, following an assessment of the site and consultation with CFA, the 33rd Harcourt Applefest went ahead and proved to be a great crowd pleaser.

The 38-degree day did not keep people away. The crowds came early and left early before the heat became too much. Entertainment by the Kashmir Belly Dancers, Thompson's Foundry Band, Harcourt Valley Primary School Choir, Castlemaine Secondary College's two ensembles, The Australian Women's Choir, Bruce Bennett on trumpet and the brilliant Duck Cameron Magician/ Conjuror all kept the families engrossed on the two stages from 10 am - 3 pm. Duck Cameron's Magic was captivating; one observer noted, 'I looked around and all I could see was a sea of smiling happy faces'. The story teller's audience was riveted with her stories that were brought alive by costumes and puppets.

The market was probably the largest ever. With over 80 market stalls around James Park, there was plenty of opportunity for both local and regional artists and makers to show their wares to the many tourists who came for the day. The mayor, Cr Matthew Driscoll, spoke in eloquent terms of the development of the apple industry from bud burst to harvest. The mayor was joined on stage by Jacinta Allan, MP Bendigo East and Premier of Victoria, Maree Edwards, MP Bendigo West-Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and Lisa Chesters MHR for Bendigo. Of course, the Baking, Lego and Pie Eating contests were huge draw cards, enjoyed by both locals and visitors to our region. The two 'hot spots' for the day were the very popular Lego Wall, where a mural was built. This was busy with both young and more mature Lego lovers, along with the free water fountain supplied by Coliban Water. Both free activities kept the little ones amused, hydrated and busy and out of

the heat. The Applefest Art Show drew many favourable comments. Food and beverage vans, offering a variety of tastes from around the world, helped make Applefest 2024 a very memorable day for all attendees.

Preparation for the great day had involved erecting the temporary stage loaned by Castlemaine Rotary Club. Never before had such a large

platform been required. A huge marquee also loaned by Rotary provided shade for the performers and made for a great setting for the entertainment later in the day.

In the balmy autumn evening, James Park was an ideal setting for the 'Dusty Springfield Show' presented by Wendy Stapleton and Friends. Over 200 people attended, and we laughed, sang and danced the night away, while enjoying local wines, spirits and beer along with some delicious food. The 'Dusty Springfield Story' is fascinating and full of joy and sadness; all told through Dusty's songs that she made famous in the 1960s to the 1990s. There were visitors from as far away as Geelong, Melbourne, Macedon, Maryborough and Bendigo who all said James Park was a wonderful venue for music events. Many people have approached the Applefest Committee to organise something similar in the future. At time of writing, the Mount Alexander Shire is seeking funding to enhance the Park with a permanent stage. Judging by Applefest 2024, this will respond to an obvious need.

### La Larr Ba Gauwa Park's Bike Trails Re-Open



La Larr Ba Gauwa Park in Harcourt has had a major restoration to bike trails and amenities and has reopened to the public thanks to extensive restoration efforts following the 2022 floods.

Member for Bendigo West Maree Edwards MP welcomed locals and visitors back to the La Larr Ba Gauwa Park's network of world-class mountain bike trails on March 12. She said, 'The upgrades at La Larr Ba Gauwa Park will benefit locals and visitors alike, providing a great space to enjoy the outdoors and learn about the area's rich cultural history.'



The restoration included repairing all eleven bike trails, catering to riders of all levels from beginners to advanced. Enhanced drainage systems were installed to safeguard the park against erosion from weather and use. Additionally, the La Larr Ba Gauwa access track was repaired.

The park's Picnic Gully campground now features a new toilet block, fire pits, and a freshly resurfaced car park and road. The introduction of new granite bollards, with landscaped camping spots reduces impacts on the surrounding natural environment.

DJANDAK was responsible for delivering the upgrades at Picnic Gully campground, incorporating Djarra design elements such as interpretative signage that highlight the area's cultural significance. La Larr Ba Gauwa translates to 'stones and mountain' in the Dja Dja Wurrung language.

The federal and state governments dedicated \$682,650 to restore the park's trail, as part of over \$11.8 million provided to 125 voluntary committees of management to restore recreation areas and facilities damaged by the 2022 floods, expanding opportunities for people to explore parks and forests.

The Labor government's Victoria's Great Outdoors program provided a \$200,000 Camping and Caravan grant to upgrade the campground, as part of a \$106.6 million investment to provide more opportunities for people to explore Victoria's iconic parks and forests, while creating local jobs and supporting the growth of regional economies. *From a Press Release*

I got some bad news today. Dad." A silence fills the room. Horror fills my thoughts. "Brad, well," tears well up in her eyes. "He's passed." I wanted to hug Mum. I wanted to cry, but I could do nothing there in my useless body. "You're all I have, Paige. Stay strong, stay strong for Dad. Stay strong for me," cries Mum. "Times up, Mary Green," said a doctor. "No I still need her, she still needs me," screams Mum.

"Good morning, Paige," I hear. "My name is doctor Savanah. I will be your doctor for your stay. Let me just draw some blood," Savanah says with a pleasant tone, but I don't get it, why is she talking to me, it's not like I can respond to her. I will just sit there doing nothing, being nothing. As the needle grazes my skin a shiver goes down my spine. I get a flashback to the crash. Glass going through my skin, piercing it with thousands of shards, the feel is identical to the needle. My mind feels light like I'm about to collapse. Well I already have collapsed.

**MUM:** "Yes, yes he is. He is dead. Gone forever."

**MAN:** "Splendid, I couldn't be happier. Now we really need to buy that beach house in California. I can just imagine it now. Our feet running through the sand"

**MUM:** "I know, right. We really do, hahaha." Cackles mum.

An alarm goes off in my head as anxiety creeps up on me. I want her to leave and go away and never ever ever come back! I don't even want to hear of Mum again, or who I thought was my Mum. I will never call her Mum again, only Mary. But that was just the beginning.

**MARY:** "You know that guy that agreed to cause the crash for \$2000 dollars?"

MAN: "Yeah, the one with brown eyes and blonde hair about 50 years Old." MARY: "Yeah him. He died, so we don't have to pay him."

**MAN:** "Hahaha, amazing, this is just amazing."

**MARY:** "Yeah, but I have one little problem."

That's what happened the night before the crash. Mary and Dad got into a fight, and he asked me to pack my bag, so in the morning, instead of going to school, we would've left. So that's when? The morning of the crash. Now that I knew, I was really tired, so I slowly drift off to sleep.

### CHAPTER FOUR WAKE UP CALL!

This morning starts off like any other - waking up, sitting in bed for like thirty minutes till Doctor Savanah comes in, but then all of a sudden the morning wasn't so normal. "Good morning, Paige. Happy birthday," she said happily. What? It's my birthday? My birthday's not till the 13th of December. I really have been paralysed or in a coma for six months. "Hello, Paige," said a voice. No, no it can't be. "Hello, Mary." Savanah said, sighing. Oh no, no, no, no. Why her? Why her, that stupid horrible woman. Oh no, she leans over and tries to hug me. I sit up and slap her across the face. A big red mark appears on her face ME: "I'm awake. I'm awake." MARY: "Paige, what was that?" ME: "What was that, you ask. That was six months of anger hatred and

fear. That was six months of torture, lying here in this bed pretty much from doing nothing. Causing the entire crash to go hang out with your new boyfriend in California in a beach house. You killed Dad and you show mercy. You are horrible and wicked person. There's not enough words in this world to define you. Get out."

**SAVANAH:** "That is what you have done to my child and my husband. You're a horrible person. You do not deserve her. You disgusting, gruesome, revolting woman. You are sick, truly sick. Get out now." **ME:** "You're my mum, Doctor Savanah?"

Doctor Savanah was my birth mum, so I went to live with her. She is the perfect mother. I love her to bits. Everything pretty much worked out. I feel like the happiest girl in the world. I have great friends, great family, great school, everything is perfect, but it might be too perfect ...

### Harcourt Heritage Centre After discharge, what next?

On ANZAC Day we recall those who died in defence of our country. We should also recall those who gave up three or four years of their young lives to serve in the armed forces. The men came from each of the services, army, navy and air force. They had been posted to a variety of units. Some had been privates, some had attained higher rank. Many had been engaged in enemy action, exposed to heavy artillery. Some had been Prisoners of War. But it was all in the past. The War was over. They came home to Harcourt in 1945 and 1946. They had been discharged from their units and believed themselves isolated from the discipline and mateship of the war years. They had to regroup. And so it was that the Harcourt sub-branch of the Returned Services League was formed on 19 February 1946.

There were about 76 ex-servicemen in Harcourt at that time, but at the first RSL meeting, held in the ANA Hall, there were sixteen members present.

One of the first projects was to procure a house for Mrs Dot Struhs, whose husband had been last heard of as a prisoner of war at Hainan Island. Donations of money and timber were noted in the RSL Sub-Branch Minute Book from time to time in the next few years. It seems that the widow's house, on the corner of Symes Rd and the Midland Highway, was ready to be occupied in 1949.

A few weeks after the Sub-Branch was formed, the members resolved to host a 'Welcome Home' for all members of the services. The ANA Hall was booked, Mrs. Gorman agreed to provide dance music, and first-class artists from Castlemaine were invited to sing or recite. Supper was to be organized by Diggers from the 1914-1918 War, assisted by several ladies.

On the actual night, the attendance was so great that any thought of holding a dance was deemed impossible and the concert program commenced. Later on in the evening, tables were set up in the centre of the hall and, as 34 exservicemen filed in to take their seats, they received thunderous applause.

Supper was handed around to all, rows of seats circling the members of the services' table were filled. The speeches were brief. After supper, the hall was cleared for dancing. Digger Ken Jones carried out the duties of emcee.

At their monthly meetings, the Diggers discussed the idea of building a Memorial Hall and erecting a monument in the Harcourt Cemetery. The monument was eventually placed to the right of, and just inside, the gate.

ANZAC Day observances were organized for Harcourt, with guest speakers from far afield. A Ladies Auxiliary was formed from among the wives, mothers, sisters or daughters of ex-servicemen. In September 1947, half a guinea (10/6) was sent to ANZAC House towards a wedding gift for HRH the Princess Elizabeth. A relief fund was opened. Preference in employment was a hot topic. It was noted that Diggers Jack Code and Trev Quirk had secured (casual) employment as Poll Clerks. These two men became familiar figures on Voting Day for many years. Digger Bert Woods was elected to the Maldon Shire Council and Digger Ben Bingham - a 'Rat of Tobruk'- was elected to the Metcalfe Shire Council. It was clear that the Sub-Branch was growing in influence and effectiveness.

The minute book tells us that the monthly meetings concluded with refreshments and what the RSL minutes described as *'the usual diggers stories'*.

We may suppose that the fortunes of the apple growers and the work at Harcourt's granite quarries were the prime topics of conversation but, just occasionally, something would surface regarding a man's experiences in the forces. Only sometimes and never very much. A practical joke on a troop transport might be recounted, or the strange habits of the Yankee servicemen, but the Diggers rarely mentioned their experiences in combat. Some of these men were unconsciously suffering from PTSD – the effects of having been in conflict situations.

Evidence of the Diggers' fragile state of mind is to be seen in the relationship between the Sub-Branch and the committee of the ANA Hall. Statements had been made in criticism of the Hall. The ANA wrote to the RSL stating that, unless they receive an apology through the Press, no future bookings would be accepted from the Sub-Branch. At the next meeting of the RSL a motion that '<u>no</u> apology be sent' was carried with a large majority.

For several months the Sub-Branch met in Jim Ely's fruit shop. Then, from July 1948 the meetings were held in the Methodist Sunday School Hall. The Diggers still held fast to the idea of building their own club rooms, but in December 1950, at the invitation of the Shire of Maldon, the Diggers agreed to take up the role of Committee of Management of the North Harcourt Hall. The Sub-Branch had a home at last.

In the meantime, a set of memorial gates had been unveiled (in 1950) in Stanley Park. Reciprocal visits with Diggers from other branches of the RSL were conducted, always an occasion for warmth and fellow feeling. Money that had been saved up to build a memorial hall was used to construct a supper room on the North Harcourt Hall.

From 1951 the minutes of the RSL Sub-Branch are mainly concerned with the administration of the North Harcourt Community Hall, even referring to efforts to improve the supply of irrigation water to the orchards, a common theme to be found whenever Harcourt folk could find a forum to air their views.

The account books of the Sub-Branch reveal that it was experiencing a thinning of the ranks. By 1970 the original 76 had fallen to fifteen financial members. The Harcourt RSL Sub-Branch merged with Castlemaine RSL in November 1971. Thereafter, the administration of the Norh Harcourt Hall reverted to a committee answerable to the Shire of Maldon. The subsequent (sometimes dramatic) history of the Hall is outside the scope of this article.

In the years 1946-1971, the Harcourt RSL Sub-Branch was, perhaps, after the orchardists' and irrigators' associations, the most cohesive and influential group in the history of Harcourt. It provided a valued network of fellowship for the men who had to regroup in the Harcourt Valley after their 1945 discharge from the armed forces.

# *The* Chewton Chat – 300 *editions of creating and recording our history*

Last Friday 22nd March, about 30 'Chewtopians' gathered to celebrate the 300th edition of the *Chewton Chat*. It was a chance to recognize the contribution of so many volunteers, most especially the founder and Editor-in-Chief John Ellis. And it brought home to me the role the *Chat* plays in making Chewton such a dynamic, rich and strong community. Like a ball of string binding us together, the *Chat* is one of the key ways that we connect with one another.

As the mic went around the Town Hall, it became clear that one of the *Chat*'s functions has been to signal our community spirit to potential new residents. We realized that at least two well-loved locals decided to make their homes in Chewton after reading the *Chewton Chat* on a visit. They quickly realized that this is the kind of community they want to live in. Thanks to the *Chat*, people with a commitment to community self-select to make Chewton their home. For others, the *Chat* was a connection to work, and an introduction to our thriving village.

John and Jan Wozitsky shared how the *Chat* was instrumental in reigniting our pride in a shared history. We heard the story of how we got heritage recognition of the Monster Meeting site and how the 1851 Monster meeting was really the first time that workers stood united in protest against the government in Victoria. Finally, Chewton came out from the Ballarat shadow.

'It's been a fabulous ride,' John told us, reminiscing about the start of the *Chat* in 1999 and its origins. 'Perhaps there is rebellion in the waters of Forest Creek, because even the origin of the *Chat* is embedded in protest. At the outset it sprang up, against efforts by the then new Mt. Alexander Shire Commissioners who intended to sell the Chewton Post Office.'

So some things have changed significantly, and others have stayed the same. The *Chat* has moved online, where it's more accessible to a wider audience, but written history is still important, so the hard copy will continue to be circulated and stored at the State and National libraries for future curious historians.

We see the trend of community newspapers being closed down or written in big centres far from the local towns. As a group on Friday night, we realised how precious it is to have a local community newspaper, written by local people who know their community.

The celebration was simple, heartfelt, and well catered, and I don't think anyone left without a little bit of pride at being part of this rebellious and welcoming community, wrapped in the warmth of community connection through the *Chewton Chat*.

### Katie Finlay's Fruit Growing Tips Fabulous Apple and Pear display at Applefest



Did you get a chance to taste all the different types of apples at this year's Applefest? Once again, Harcourt growers did us proud and the Fruit Growers tent was able to present a fabulous display of varieties, all grown here in Harcourt.



We'd like to give a special shout-out to Gavin Lang from Langdale Orchards and Trevor Peeler from the Harcourt Cooperative Coolstores for gathering apples and pears from most of Harcourt's growers. Henry of Harcourt added interest to the display with some of their cider apples. The Orchard Keepers (that's the orchard on our place) also contributed many varieties to the display, with plans afoot to be bringing many more of the old heritage varieties to the public in coming years.

We'd also like to thank Joe from Redlands Orchards for generously donating some of the new varieties they have under development, including Dazzle and Sassy apples. Most of Redlands fruit is grown for the export market, so the Applefest is a rare opportunity for locals and visitors to taste some of these world-class apples that are being developed right here in Harcourt.

Here are some of the varieties we had on display. (How many have you heard of?): Beurre Bosc (pear), Bonza, Bramley, Chieftain Red Delicious, Corella (pear), Cox's Orange Pippin, Dazzle, Fuji, Golden Delicious, Granny Smith, Gravenstein, Jonagold, Jonathan, Josephine (pear), Kingston Black, Michelin, Mutsu, Packham (pear), Sassy, Somerset Gala, Snow, Sturmer Pippin, WD Gala, Williams bon Cretian (pear), Winter Nelis (pear), Ya Li Nashi, Yarlington Mill. (There were more but we can't remember what they were!) Help prevent the spread of Fruit Fly What a beautiful start to autumn. It's been another mild, late season. Fruit is ripening slowly and the trees are just starting to change colour. It looks like we'll be in for a stunning display this year.

Fruit fly has made its presence known late in the season. We've found a few infected pieces of fruit in one of the plum varieties at our place. Our protocols seem to be working well, but we're asking anyone who buys fruit from us (or any other grower in Harcourt) to be part of the front-line defence system by letting us know if any infected fruit slip through our controls.

The other thing you can do to help prevent fruit fly from spreading is to educate yourself about how to manage this pest in your home garden. The biggest risk is unmanaged and feral fruit trees. If fruit flies are allowed to get established in fruit trees in backyards, on roadsides, or in the bush (or the mountain bike park, in Harcourt's case) – that's when the pressure can really start to build up.

If you've got a fruit tree please keep monitoring your traps and fruit right until the end of the season. Follow all the hygiene recommendations, which are mainly about cleaning up ALL your fallen fruit as soon as it falls. (This stops the fruit fly larvae from getting into the soil to finish their lifecycle.) This one simple thing can make a big difference to how hard we'll be hit next season. You can definitely help to make a big difference to whether we can all (orchardists and backyard growers) keep growing fruit into the future.

If you have a fruit tree you can't look after, please think about getting rid of it this winter and replacing it with a beautiful ornamental!

#### *Time to remove nets over fruit trees*

Now is the time to put away your nets if you used them on your fruit trees over summer. Nets get damaged and wear out much faster if they're left out in the weather all year. Early autumn is the perfect time for this job because they slip off more easily while the tree still has leaves, so don't wait too long to get the job done. Of course if your apple or pear tree still has fruit, then leave the nets in place for now, because the birds will take advantage of the free feed if you take them off early.

If you've used drape netting (as opposed to having put up some sort of frame to hold

the net off the tree) a handy tip is to use a long stick to push the nets off the tree, being careful not to damage the ends of the limbs if possible. Disentangle any twigs, branches, leaves, or rotten fruit before you pack them away. If you can pack and store them so they're rat-proof, you'll thank yourself next summer when you go to put them out again. If the net has any holes (from persistent kangaroos, for example), your future self will thank you very much if you repair the nets now, before you put them away. This is usually a simple matter of sewing the holes up with UV-stable nylon thread, or tying the edges together with cable ties or even hayband (baling twine).

On another note, if you're noticing some of your fruit trees flowering (despite the fact that it's not spring and we'll soon be descending into winter) don't panic. It's not uncommon for fruit trees to have a last ditch attempt to produce some fruit. It might be an indication of a sick or stressed tree, but it is also common in perfectly healthy trees – it's just the genetic drive to reproduce. The flowers or tiny fruit that form will most likely just drop off as the weather cools down.
