

Update on the Community Campaign to have a Passenger Rail Service re-commenced at Harcourt Station

The HPA Committee was privileged to have The Honorable Maree Edwards MP, Member for Bendigo West, attend our last meeting (7 October) to provide an update to the committee members on the much-discussed topic of reintroducing the passenger rail service to the Harcourt station.

Maree had also kindly arranged for two senior officials from the Department of Transport and Planning to attend the meeting to assist in explaining in some detail, the current situation with the topic and also to enable committee members to raise questions and/or clarify any issues.

The following is a summary of specific points referenced in the presentation from Maree and the two officers, who outlined:

- ► That subsequent to a formal review by the Department of Transport of the project to duplicate the rail line between Kyneton and Bendigo and also to re-introduce a passenger rail service to Harcourt Station, there have been some structural challenges identified, due to:
 - The, generally, current single-track rail line arrangement from Kyneton to Bendigo;
 - the location of some notable heritage structures (tunnels) along the line that are not able to

- safely accommodate dual rail tracks;
- the specific location of some significant curves in the rail line adjacent to the current station platform.

Each of which, presents challenges in determining the specific positioning of an appropriate platform at Harcourt Railway Station, suitable for the faster trains to stop, and also:

 the overall government proposal to increase the frequency of rail services on regional rail lines to every 40 minutes.

The above situation will result in a need for a platform to be located in a position adjacent to a straighter section of rail line. The department officials then outlined that such a re-location option would likely include, being generally:

- east of the Rail Bridge crossing over the Calder Motorway;
- south of the current Railway Station Platform; and on
- the eastern (Coolstore Road) side of the main rail-line.

Discussion also referenced the VicTrack open space land on the Coolstore Road side of the station complex and which is ideally positioned for use as rail patron car-parking. The committee members then raised the matter of the extensive current invasion of environmental weeds and trees growing in, and in fact, damaging the existing heritage infrastructure at the station site – noting in particular, the former goods rail line and platforms

and other associated infrastructure.

The department officials noted that they will follow-up on this matter and communicate back to the committee.

Further to the above discussion, Maree Edwards then outlined to the committee a proposal presently being investigated as an interim measure. The proposal seeks the provision of a bus service between Castlemaine and Harcourt stations to operate on a timetable specifically to arrive at Castlemaine Station shortly ahead of north or south bound rail services stopping at Castlemaine. Such an arrangement would enable local and district travellers to either walk to the Harcourt station or park their vehicles on the referenced VicTrack land on the Coolstore Road side of the rail line and then catch the suggested bus service to Castlemaine. Maree advised that she will keep the committee updated on progress with this proposal.

The HPA Committee is also preparing for the formal submission to the government of the extensive community petition which has been collected over the past year from Harcourt and District residents; such petition specifically requesting the reintroduction of a passenger rail service to Harcourt Station.

Harcourt Valley Landcare recently held an event with a focus on maintaining a healthy environment in the face of climate change. President Terry Willis opened the evening with the words of welcome acknowledging the country of the Dia Dia Wurrung people. As an introduction, he mentioned the benefits that Landcarers have because of their connection with our natural world. He said, "As Landcarers, we are fascinated with our environment and we share stories of wonder and excitement about plants and animals we encounter and encourage to thrive. We also share failures and successes so that we can adapt as the climate changes. We have a strong connection to country, we aim to protect wildlife corridors and understand and encourage biodiversity in our surrounds."

Invited guest speakers for the event were: Monique Miller, Paul Foreman, Nicole Howie and Stephen Oxley. They were asked the challenging question: In the face of climate change what does meaningful local environmental action look like to you?

Monique has worked on conservation since 2017, with a special focus on rare and declining flora and is known for her amazing ability to remember the Latin names of plants, and has worked as a Restoration Project Officer at Bush Heritage Australia. Over the four years in this work she saw the effect of climate change. She said, "I observed the 2021 La Niña and the associated floods, the 2022 floods, the 2023 average year leading into 2024-25 where we experienced the worst drought since the millennial drought. I saw the bush transformed. I've seen the bush in late winter look like it was late summer, when the rehydrating season did not occur and Bell's swamp stayed dry. Mass flowering seasons did not occur, or they were very late, plants were either not flowering, or there were not as many flowers."

Monique said, "I'm trying to highlight the Sisyphean task of conservation work in a climate change environment. The way to deal with this is local and community-based action; so Landcare is on the right track. But also, support each other to stay and maintain these changes. For every action you take to change the world, make sure you look after yourself. I like the quote from Arthur Ashe the tennis player who said: 'Start where you are. Use what you have. Do what you can." She said, "The three great challenges in facing climate change are people's disconnection from nature, from themselves and each other." In summary, Monique said: "You can't do everything, but you can join Landcare and share the skills you have. Make whatever small changes you can e.g. put a frog pond in your garden. Bring your children along and keep them inspired; they are our future and will continue what we have started."

Stephen Oxley, our next speaker, has a back-



ground in journalism and experience in environmental leadership and community conservation. He had a thirty-year career in Canberra in different roles with the Federal Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water, and is a member of the Committee of Management of Connecting Country.

Stephen said his challenge as a new arrival in Guildford, is to bring his experience from his working life to a local community, to make a difference. He said, "There is no action without local action. If we don't collectively act at the local level, then not a lot of difference is made. Landcare is the epitome of collective local action and it's amazing to see how Landcare has developed. In the Mount Alexander Shire alone there are over thirty Landcare groups." Stephen also believes that individual action, including the consumption choices we make in our households; our recreational activities, how we holiday, and all facets of our life will make a difference to the environment." He said, "We don't need to be perfect, but we have to have intent. We have to individually and collectively reduce our carbon footprint of our existence over time. Collectively our individual choices are impactful."

Stephen said, "The Mount Alexander Shire has relatively high native vegetation cover compared with many other parts of Australia. We have about twenty per cent of remnant box iron bark woodlands, but it is starkly different to what it was before the appearance of Europeans. It is fragmented, lacks diversity and has reduced ecological function. This is the fundamentally important challenge that, when overlaid with the climate outlook, becomes even more daunting. This underlines the importance of all the things we can do in the landscape to improve the ecological system function and resilience so that it becomes more adaptable to climate change."

Paul Foreman, who has had a strong relationship with Harcourt Valley Landcare over a number of years, spoke next. He assisted the group when it challenged the original "final" version of Plan Harcourt and represented the group at VCAT. As a result of our combined efforts, Plan Harcourt was re-written with environmental controls for proposed development areas in Harcourt. Our other mutual interest is in the protection of *Ballantinia antipoda* (Southern Shepherd's Purse), an endemic plant on

Mount Alexander which grows in moss mats on wet slopes. The plant was first described in 1845. Paul said, "The environmental envelope suitable for Ballantinia is shrinking; it was once found in Tasmania and other places in Victoria, now it is restricted only to Mount Alexander it's our critical endangered species. It is expected that the plant will be extinct by 2050, but there are things we can do, like restoration of habitat, translocation work and seed collections, but it needs to be funded, implemented and have expertise. It could go extinct under our watch. We have to keep bringing attention to the authorities. Advocacy and collective action is important. I don't think that the government will step in; we know that this community is passionate and, if they put their minds to it, they can do all sorts of things.

"Another example of a local threatened species is the goldfields grevillea (grevillea dryophylla). Its biggest population here is in the Walmer Forest. There could be 20 or 30 thousand plants. Sadly, the state government burnt the area in a fuel reduction burn earlier this year. Fire has the effect that the plants die and then they regenerate by seed but, if another fire goes through within a few years, the young plants won't have had time to develop seed, so there will be a reduction in numbers. The good news is that they can be regenerated from seed. By this method, I hope to develop a new population from the 100 plants I have on my property."

Paul's other work is with the Biolinks Alliance. He said, "The bush here has been degraded by the gold rush. We did a project at Heathcote which has similar sedimentary bush found in this area. We used ecological thinning and used contour ploughing and pond establishment over 130 to 140 hectares, and it worked well. We need to roll this out at scale across more bushland to make the bush healthier and more resilient for animals, birds. There are solutions we just need to get together, get the resources, get the know-how and have the determination to make these things happen."

Nicole Howie, our next speaker, runs the school program River Detectives. This is an NCMA (North Central Catchment Management Authority) program delivered from Swan Hill to Woodend. Nicole is also secretary of the Northern Bendigo Landcare Group. She said, "I am a teacher and a lover of nature. Kids are always curious and love to be outside. When I'm asked, 'What can I do to combat climate change?' My answer is, by connecting kids with nature. I run the River Detectives program for three days a week and teach bush kinder the other days. I believe that citizen science is a catalyst for change.

"I have thirty schools I support in the North Central Region and there are always more tapping on the door. The program has a school adopt a local waterway. They get a kit to regularly test water quality. They also test for temperature, salinity, phosphorous, PH (acidity) and turbidity (dirtiness). Currently, five local schools are river detective schools. They collect data which show patterns in the water quality, month





by month, season by season, they get to know their local surroundings, they take pride in their waterway, and the best thing is, the program is a springboard for everything else.

"My other work is teaching bush kinder two days a week. At Huntly, every child plays in bushland for three hours a week in the Bush Kinder program. It ticks every part in the curriculum and fosters extra curiosity and communication. For example, as a cubby is being built it develops skills like negotiation and resilience. Never underestimate the learning capacity of a four or five year old! There is a ripple effect—their interests go home. Bush kinders are hugely popular. There's no equipment to fight over, nothing to pack up, there's space and freedom and quiet, and no swings to fight over."

The takeaway message from Nicole's talk is that if young people and families are engaged, environmental awareness is increased and learning takes place without it being onerous or boring. Environmental values and awareness become embedded at an early age, which can only assist and influence behaviour in relation to our surrounds.

Harcourt Valley Landcare is the perfect group for you and your family to join. You and your children will learn lots about our local environment; get your hands dirty, be excited and educated about the special plants and animals that make their home here.

Following the speakers, there was a short question time. Terry Willis thanked the presenters and noted some salient points we could take to heart. A delicious meal was served (thanks to Remy at The Coolstore) and people shared their impressions and ideas raised by the speakers.





Mount Alexander Shire Council is offering free green waste disposal to help residents prepare homes and properties for the upcoming fire danger period.

Residents can dispose of green waste at no cost at the Castlemaine and Maldon transfer stations from Saturday 15 November to Sunday 30 November.

- Green waste includes garden waste such as grass, sticks and branches that are less than 10cm in diameter.
- ► The green waste must be free of contaminants such as rubbish and declared noxious weeds and removed from plastic bags prior to disposal.
- Loads containing items other than green waste will be charged accordingly.
- Residents are also encouraged to compost as much material as possible at home
- Proof of residence in the shire will be required.

Normal green waste disposal fees will apply to businesses or residents acting on behalf of businesses.

Normal gate fees will apply before and after the free green waste disposal period.

It looks like November is going to need the mowers working overtime with the grass growth that is occurring around the district.

Rain in the latter part of October has ensured that the grass continues to grow, along with the weeds, meaning the task of cleaning up and maintaining our properties will be ongoing until the promised warmer weather dries and cures the grass and stops its growth. This will occur sooner rather than later because the moisture content of the ground is lower than normal.

This will lead into the implementation of the fire danger period (FPD) which has now been set to commence at 1.00am on Monday **November 17** for the Shires of Mount Alexander and Greater City of Bendigo. They will stay in force until **April 30** unless removed earlier.

Meanwhile, the bush areas are drier than they have been at the same time in recent years. The Chief Officer of the CFA wants to ensure that all Victorians are aware of the fire risk this season, and this was one of the reasons why he wanted brigades to conduct an open day in October.

We had our open day on Sunday October 5 and had a few residents come and visit. They were able to look at local mapping showing the levels of fire risk throughout their property, as well as information to assist in formulating a fire plan. We do have bags left over, so we will be out and about on some upcoming occasions where we can chat further with residents.

It was good to note that everyone we asked on the day had the Vic Emergency App on their phone, and had their watch zone set up as well.

Brigade Preparation

Members have been busy again preparing for summer. The mandatory entrapment drills have been carried out by all members. Some members attended the Pre-Season Briefing night at Kyneton.

Our two tankers and crew participated in the Mount Alexander Group exercise held at Taradale on Sunday October 26. This was well attended, with all group brigades participating and more than ninety firefighters involved. Unfortunately, due to lightning activity, it was called

off due to safety concerns, so everyone adjourned to the Taradale fire station for an early BBQ lunch and discussion.

Brigade Activity

October has been a busy month with eleven turnouts in total. Only three of these were primary calls, and the remaining eight support calls were to Castlemaine (five) and one each to Elphinstone, Ravenswood and Campbells Creek.

There were two bin fires (at each end of the month), three motor vehicle incidents (our three primary calls), three reported fires which were false alarms, a diesel fuel spill at the Ravenswood service station, one gas leak and a house fire at Cambells Creek.

Emergency Services Expo

Did you get to the biennial Emergency Services Expo this year? Our popular squirty trucks were in action and were popular with kids of all ages. There was a steady stream of people taking the opportunity to meet with all emergency services, including police, ambulance, CFA, Forest Fire Management and the SES.

Our squirty trucks were in action again the next day at the Chewton Brigade open day. They have since undergone a maintenance refit including new wheel bearings and minor repair.

How is your fire safety equipment going?

When did you last check your fire extinguisher, fire pump and hoses, your fire plan, emergency kit and ancillary equipment? Are you ready for this summer's fire season? Is your plan to leave early or are you going to stay and defend?

Worth a second look: Stencils

Harcourt Heritage Centre collection includes several tin stencils. Visitors to the Museum might not pay much attention to these perforated stencils, but they are worth a second look as they tell quite a story.

The stencils were used to brand fruit cases to indicate the source and destination of Harcourt fruit for sale to local, interstate and overseas markets. The collection also includes the ink block and brush used for painting the stencil information onto the wooden box.

There is a great deal of variety in this collection of stencils. Some proudly proclaim the grower's name, others provide the size of the apples -2,2% 2%,2%,2%,2%,2%,3 – all sizes being in inches.

For Harcourt apples consigned to domestic markets, the majority of the stencils indicate the wholesale market agent's name, the market stand number and either "Sydney" or "Brisbane". In most instances the stencils were handed to the fruit grower by agents for the market stand proprietors who went from orchard to orchard searching out suppliers.

The importance of the stencilled marks is seen when we recall that, from time to time, Harcourt's fruit growers complained that cases of apples and pears destined for export or for interstate markets were repeatedly roughly handled. Fruit consigned to the Sydney market had to be transferred from one rail wagon to another at the border where the rail gauge changed. Fruit despatched to Brisbane was again loaded from one rail wagon to another at the Queensland border. And there was always the danger that fruit would go astray.

Worse still, there were no less than four transfers of cases of export fruit, from goods train to the government coolstores, from the coolstores onto

lighters to carry them to Port Melbourne or Williamstown and then from lighter to ship. At each transfer, the handlers had to keep an eye on the stencilled brands. At the other end of the journey, be it Sydney, Brisbane or London, the local storemen had to note the brands, check the quantities against the consignment note and distribute the fruit to the correct agent's market stand. Thus, there were many opportunities for fruit to be mislaid, sent to the wrong place or just left on the wharf. Without the stencilled marks the fruit would not reach its destination, and the grower would not receive the proceeds of sales.


Sydney's fresh fruit and vegetable wholesale market was (and still is) located at Haymarket in the heart of the city. On market days, the laneways inside the market were thronged with professional buyers, greengrocers, hoteliers and restaurateurs. A similar throng would have been seen at Brisbane's Roma Street Markets from 1906 to 1964. These markets were tucked beside the rail line, handy to the Brisbane wharf area.

There is an interesting black and white photo in the Verey collection originally commissioned by Rowe Motors, Castlemaine, to advertise the 1927 new model Fordson Tractor. Local orchardist Harry Ford is depicted standing on the tractor's trailer drawbar leaning on a load of fruit cases outside the Harcourt Cooperative Coolstors. The cases on the trailer bear the Ford

Bros stencil and are marked with the size of the apples 2¾" or 3", uniformly sized big fruit, fancy grade, specially selected for export to England.

Stencils used on boxes for the famed Covent Garden markets are simply "London", and 'Bremen"for the German north-sea port.

In a good season 350,000 cases of fruit were sent from the Harcourt railway station



"As a boat is leaving for England every week, the fruit has to be most carefully picked, every apple sorted, graded, wrapped in tissue paper, and packed. The cases must be nailed down and stencilled at both ends and then despatched. On a Monday morning the apples are growing in the orchard and on the following Saturday morning a boat is leaving Melbourne with 500 cases of apples from that orchard."

Another writer reminds us that:

"One end of the box was marked using stove black and a stencil to indicate Jonathon or Granny Smith apples and what size of fruit. To the other end of the box the colourful grower's label was attached with clag."

With a bit of imagination we can visualise the export of fruit. Burly wharf labourers heaving bushel cases of apples and pears into the hold of a ship is one scene that comes to mind. The actual voyage of such a ship has been described by Australian poet Capel Boake as. "The rolling cargo steamer, her curl of smoke behind" and, towards the end of a long sea voyage, the ship and its precious cargo of fruit could be seen "... rolling up the channel where the cliffs of Dover frown, feeling through the fog banks to the port of London town."

From the 1890s right up to the late 1960s, stencils were always to be found hanging on a nail in Harcourt's packing sheds. Cardboard fruit cartons superseded the use of stencils about 1970.

Stencils were an integral part of the economy of an industry that brought prosperity to this valley in the twentieth century.



Every week, 185,000 people access Neighbourhood Houses in Victoria. Around half of all Neighbourhood Houses in Victoria are running at a loss.

This cannot continue.

State-wide campaign to increase funding to Community Houses including funding for unfunded houses like Harcourt Valley Community House

Some facts...

There are 401 Neighbourhood or Community Houses (CHs) across Victoria which collectively see 185,000 people every week for Friendship, Advocacy, Resilience, Wellbeing, Support, Connection and/or Learning.

- ▶ About half of those CHs are running at a loss and have been doing so for the past two years. The cost of living, additional demands (like food relief, running costs etc) and a lag in government funding (to match these increasing costs) has eroded their capacity to serve the communities as they have traditionally done.
- ➤ Twenty-five of those 401 houses are unfunded, namely they do not receive the Neighbourhood House Coordination Program (NHCP) funding. Harcourt Valley CH is one of the 25! The funding, while welcome only covers the award level wages for a coordinator for 20 hours a week, leaving nothing for overheads, the running of programs and related materials.
- ▶ At Harcourt, we have a voluntary manager who opens two hours a week (though many more hours are done "behind the scenes"). We have building overheads (power, WIFI, rent, insurances) of \$7,000 a year. With grateful thanks to Mt Alexander Shire, we have been thrown a lifeline of \$7K, as a one-off allocation to get us through 2025/2026 while we try to secure ongoing funding.

Help save Neighbourhood Houses – Send a Postcard

Neighbourhood Houses Victoria (NHVic) have launched a campaign to send hundreds of thousands of postcards to Minister Ros Spence MP to highlight the plight of communities in danger of losing their Neighbourhood House and to seek additional funding in the lead-up to the 2026 State Election. In Harcourt's case, we are seeking ongoing funding for OUR Community House. Along with other Community

Houses in Mt Alexander Shire (Castlemaine and Maldon) and those in the City of Greater Bendigo, we aim to deliver tens of thousands of postcards to our sitting member, the Hon Maree Edwards before 14 December with local media engaged to highlight this vital service.

We ask you to sign a postcard to support Neighbourhood Houses, but most importantly, to support the potential to fund the Harcourt Valley Community House. Just think what we could achieve with the consistency of a paid manager working at least 20 hours a week! While volunteers do their best, typically, they just can't provide that level of commitment and consistency.

How to sign a postcard?

Firstly, our many thanks to our community partners, who all have a supply of postcards and a special box to put them in. There is no need to place a stamp on the postcard if you "post" them locally in a collection box.

- The Harcourt Post Office, High Street Harcourt. (Please do not place in the red Australia Post mailbox out the front, go into the Post Office to put it in the special box.)
- The Heritage Centre (open Wednesdays) ANA Hall – also High Street Harcourt.
- ► The Coolstore Café, Coolstore Road Harcourt.

► The Harcourt Valley Community House at 23 Station Street, Harcourt – open Wednesdays 12:30pm - 2:30pm (but slip it under the door at any other time!).

Look out for our marquee promoting HVCH and the postcard campaign at Gather Harcourt on Saturday 29 November.

We hope to do a letter-box drop in the coming weeks (in letter-boxes that do not display a "no junk mail" sign as we respect your right not to accept unsolicited mail).

By the way, if you have already signed a postcard (thank you), please don't sign another one; like a petition, it will not be counted twice.

The postcard might be on card (like a postcard) or on paper, it makes no difference as we hope to run out of cards and then we will make our own! Your signature, name and address is like signing a petition, and it will be counted as a concerned citizen who cares about your local Community House and what it can do for your community.

Thank you in advance for your help to secure recurrent funding for the Harcourt Valley Community House.

Scam Awareness Session

On Thursday 23 October, as part of the Victorian Seniors Festival, a scam awareness session was held at Harcourt Valley Community House. Hosted by Community Bank Maldon & District, experts from Bendigo Bank's Financial Crimes Division shared a presentation about what to watch out for in the ever-changing world of online scams. Fraudulent schemes designed to steal money or personal information are increasingly common, with phishing schemes, fake investment opportunities and fake invoices all being discussed. The main takeaways from the session were:

STOP: Don't give money or personal information to anyone if you're unsure.

THINK: Ask yourself if the message or call could be a fake.

PROTECT: Act quickly if something feels wrong.

- Beware of anyone offering easy money.
- Check invoices, bills and payment requests before you pay them by calling the business on the publicly listed number.
- Add multi-factor authentication (MFA) to your mobile devices (a code, token, a secret question or your face or fingerprint



(biometrics)) to show you are who you say you are when you login to online services.

- Never provide personal or login information, passwords or codes over the phone or via text to anyone who has contacted you.
- **5. Don't click on links** from unexpected emails or texts.
- 6. If you feel uncertain or pressured, check in with someone you trust.

- A bank will never ask you to login to e-banking via a link sent in an SMS or email.
- **8.** Immediately report any suspicious activity to your bank.

Weather & Water

Spring in all its variability

In the past month we found we could do without the combustion stove for heating on quite a few days, however, the air conditioning was still needed to keep the air at a reasonable temperature. The spring show of flowers began early in the month and has continued. There were a few frosts and one or two days where the temperature nearly reached 30 degrees. Strong wind warnings were issued for at least two days during the month, and, as predicted by the Bureau of Meteorology, there were high tides, loss of power and building damage in some areas of Victoria.

In my weather report for October, I mentioned the Polar Vortex and its drying effect on the weather. It would seem that the worst has been avoided as enough rain has fallen over our catchments to increase inflows and thus storage levels. But there may be an underlying dry trend. Here at Reservoir Road, this year's rainfall total to date of 383 mm is lower than hoped. There have been seven years since 2002 where the total to this date was lower; three of those were in the ten-year drought from 2000 to 2009. This year the autumn break failed which set the growth season off to a bad start. The appearance of the country has improved with cooler temperatures, but there has been recent concern about lack of moisture past the top few centimetres of soil.

The long-range forecast summary for Australia according to the Bureau of Meteorology for November to January shows: "Rainfall is likely to be above average for parts of the east and below average for parts of the north and west.

Daytime temperatures are likely to be above average for most of Australia except in parts of eastern New South Wales.

Overnight temperatures are very likely to be above average across most of Australia."

Irrigation allocation increased to 75%

Harcourt irrigators met with representatives of Coliban Water on 18 September to express their dissatisfaction with a 30% allocation for the coming irrigation season. As providers of food and wine locally, and for the country as a whole, they felt singled out for restrictions as nothing similar was planned for domestic users or general rural water users. On 15 October Coliban contacted local irrigators to tell them that the seasonal water allocation for 2025/26 was increased to 75%. This news was naturally greeted with relief.

Inflows to the reservoirs improved markedly in July and August, and were maintained for September, but petered off in October, however, the inflow was still above the figure for July. As at 3 November, the combined reservoir levels (those shown below and also Coliban's share of Lake Eppalock) were at 65%.

KATIE FINLAY'S FRUIT GROWING TIPS

Hi everyone

Our orchard volunteer exchange program (called Fruit Crew) has started for the season, and it's great to get it going again. Forty enthusiastic volunteers have put their hands up to help grow this year's fruit crop. In exchange they get weekly lessons, free fruit and lots of cake! Our experience last year showed us that what our volunteers really valued was being part of a community - which is funny, because that was definitely one of the highlights for us as well!

Catch us at the weekly Castlemaine Farmers Market

The other good news is that our fruit will be available again this season for locals to buy! We'll be at the weekly Castlemaine Farmers Market every Wednesday afternoon at the Camp Reserve from 2 pm-5 pm. We'll also do the occasional special/bulk box, so keep an eye on The Orchard Keepers Instagram to hear about them. Apricots and cherries are looking like having light crops this year, and the plums, apples and pears are all looking excellent.

Leaf Curl on Fruit Trees

Have you had any leaf curl on your peach or nectarine trees? If so, there are three things you need to know:

- Once you've got it, you've got it this season and there's nothing you can do about it now.
- (2) It will miraculously disappear from your trees very soon as the weather warms up, and then your trees will look much better!
- (3) You need to take preventive action next winter to make sure you don't get it again next year. Keep an eye on this column, and we'll explain what to do closer to the time.

If you have curly leaves in your plum trees it's a different problem! There are lots of aphids about this year and they're the likely culprit. If you spot a patch of aphids you can wash them off or spot spray them with an organic spray (or even just soapy water). You can even cut infected bunches of

leaves off, but only if it's not going to ruin the structure of your tree. Another tip for beating aphids is to check if there are ants in the tree. Ants "farm" the aphids and protect them from predators, so it's a good idea to exclude the ants from the tree with some sort of sticky barrier around the trunk. Luckily, they can't fly so this strategy usually works.

Time to Thin Fruit

Now that flowering has finished, it's time to start thinning your fruit. Thinning is the process of pulling some of the tiny fruit off, and it's one of the most important jobs in spring for all deciduous fruit types like apricots, peaches, nectarines, plums, apples and pears. There's no need to thin your cherry trees. It can be a hard job to do! It feels wasteful to be throwing all that fruit on the ground, but rest assured, if you do it early i.e. now you won't reduce the overall size of your harvest (or not much anyway). In theory, you'll get almost the same volume of fruit, but in fewer pieces.

Here are four excellent reasons to thin:

- (1) Most fruit trees have a natural biennial bearing cycle a heavy crop one year, followed by a light crop the following year (sound familiar?). Thinning makes the tree react as if this is its 'off' year, so it will set another full crop next year. Once you understand that, it's obvious why you have to do it every year!
- (2) To protect the structure of your tree, and make sure no branches or laterals break from carrying too much fruit
- (3) To grow larger fruit, because the tree's energy is put into fewer pieces of fruit – you get more delicious juicy flesh and less core!
- (4) It helps control pests and diseases by allowing the fruit to dry faster after rain so fungal disease has less opportunity to spread, and removing habitat for pests in the lovely dark spaces where fruit hangs in bunches.

In deciding how much fruit to remove, first assess the overall crop load: does the tree have a heavy, medium or light crop? Factors like the age of the tree, how healthy the tree is, how much



water you have available, how long until the fruit will be ripe, and the ultimate size of the fruit also affect how much fruit you need to remove.

Set your Fruit Fly Traps Now

And finally, it's definitely time to get your fruit fly traps out. Some fruit flies will have overwintered as adults, so it's important to start monitoring early in the season so you know if they turn up or start to get active in your garden. Then you can be ready with your next line of defence (e.g. netting, female traps, or an organic spray).


